The <u>Mascot Development Workgroup</u> has been working diligently this year to finalize a mascot that will represent our entire student body and align with our mission to be a welcoming and inclusive community. The next step in the process is for the <u>Consultative Council</u> to review the recommendation. Once the trademark search is completed and the branding guide is published, we plan to officially unveil the new mascot at the *April 21*, *2025*, Board of Trustees meeting, with a recommendation for approval.

Thank you to everyone who has been involved in the process, but most importantly to the <u>Associated Student</u> <u>Government</u>, which brought forward the initial recommendation during the 2021-2022 year, and to the Mascot Development Workgroup for seeing the mascot renaming through.

Spring 2025 Enrollment Update

As of *yesterday, March 27, 2025*, Compton College generated 1,584 FTES for the Spring 2025 term. Our fill rate for Spring is currently 69%, and 11,237 seats are filled.

President/CEO Closing the Loop

- 1. My responses to the <u>Academic Senate</u> Summary of Decisions made at the *March 6, 2025* meeting are available <u>here</u>.
- 2. A Collaborative Governance Workgroup has been established and will report to the <u>Consultative</u> <u>Council</u>. The workgroup will be co-chaired by Sheri Berger, vice president of Academic Affairs, and Academic Senate President Sean Moore. The focus of the workgroup will be to review the <u>Collaborative</u> <u>Governance Recommendations</u> prepared by Dr. Ding-Jo Currie, former Chancellor of Coast Community College, and Dolores Davison, former statewide Academic Senate President, and to develop a plan for moving forward with potential next steps. In addition, the workgroup will revise the <u>Collaborative</u> <u>Governance at Compton College Document</u>. The goal is to complete this work by *December 31, 2025*.

3. An email was sent to all currently enrolled students on my behalf, providing an update on immigration enforcement activities within our District (with no reported incidents at this time) and available resources, including free legal assistance from CHIRLA (appointments can be scheduled online at <u>findyourally.com</u>). Additionally, please note that CHIRLA will be present at the Compton College Farmers' Market on the fourth Wednesday of every month from 3:00 to 5:00 p.m. to answer questions and provide resources to the immigrant community.

New California Index Ranks 4-Year Institutions Delivering on Economic Mobility.

The <u>College Futures Foundation</u> prioritizes economic mobility through postsecondary education for underserved learners in California. They recognize that higher education is a critical pathway to economic wellbeing, especially for first-generation college students, students of color, adults seeking to reskill or upskill, and low-income communities. Last year, College Futures partnered with Michael Itzkowitz of the HEA Group to release two reports: <u>Golden Opportunities: Measuring Return on Investment in California Higher Education for Low- and Moderate-Income Learners</u> and <u>California College Programs That Pay: Measuring ROI Across</u> <u>Majors and Credentials</u>. These reports examined the time it takes low- to moderate-income learners to recoup their educational costs across various types of institutions and specific college majors and programs. They found that nearly four out of five institutions allowed these learners to recoup their costs in less than one year; however, many institutions with the quickest return on investment (ROI) enrolled very few low- and moderate-income learners.

To address this, College Futures and the HEA Group launched the <u>California Mobility Index (CMI)</u>, a new ranking system for California's four-year colleges and universities. The CMI evaluates institutions based on inclusivity and economic outcomes, focusing on the proportion of low- and moderate-income learners they enroll and the ROI they provide. The index includes 82 four-year institutions that together enroll nearly 800,000 undergraduate students.

Final Thoughts

I am pleased to provide an update on the District's <u>Emergency Operations Plan</u> (EOP). We are currently collaborating with Keenan & Associates to update the EOP this spring. Our goal is to present the revised plan to the Board of Trustees for review and approval at their meeting on *June 16, 2025*, in accordance with <u>Board</u> <u>Policy 3505</u>, <u>Emergency Response Plan</u>. It is crucial to have an EOP that is up-to-date and accurately outlines the procedures the District implements in the event of an emergency. This ensures that we are prepared to respond effectively and protect the safety and well-being of our campus community.

Additionally, we have established a <u>policy statement regarding Campus Closures</u>. This policy, which has been shared with the <u>Health, Safety, and Parking Committee</u>, the Deans and Directors Council, and the <u>Consultative Council</u>, is available online <u>here</u>. It outlines clear protocols and communication methods for emergencies or unexpected/unplanned events that necessitate campus closure.

Furthermore, I encourage everyone to <u>sign up with Nixle</u> to receive real-time alerts and advisories directly from the Compton College District Police Department. Staying informed is a key component of our emergency preparedness efforts. Together, we can ensure the safety and resilience of our campus community.
